

Death of Edward A. Ray.

NEW HAVEN, Oct. 5.—Edward Addison Ray, for many years Treasurer of the New Haven & Northampton Railroad, died here to-day as a result of a shock he received in a street car accident a few weeks ago. Mr. Ray, who was 82 years old, was in a car that jumped its track and then collided with a telegraph pole. Mr. Ray was badly shaken up by the force of the impact. Miss Anna Chapin Ray, the novelist, is a daughter of Mr. Ray.

A cable message received by relatives yesterday morning announced the death in Berlin of HORACE C. BREWSTER, prominent in social, business, and political circles in Rochester. With his wife, Mr. Brewster was making a tour of the world.

JOHN W. BUTTIKOFER, who for many years was engaged in the piano trade in this city, died at his home, 1,936 Anthony Avenue, on Friday in his 45th year. He was for some years in the piano business with his father, but left the firm to take a prominent position with the Sohrem Piano Company. The burial will take place to-day in the White Plains Rural Cemetery.

ABRAHAM CRAIG, known throughout the country as an inventor and clock maker, died yesterday at his home, 75 Lauriat Avenue, Dorchester, Mass., after a short illness from pneumonia. He was 73 years old.

Miss MARY F. SEYMOUR, daughter of the late Charles St. John and Elizabeth Seymour, died on Friday at her home, 26 The Crescent, Montclair, N. J. Miss Seymour belonged to one of the old families of Montclair. For a number of years she was in charge of a fashionable young ladies' school on Bloomfield Avenue, but retired about fourteen years ago. The funeral will be held to-morrow afternoon.

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
